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The Outer Sunset is the perfect destination for a weekend staycation, with Golden Gate Park to the north, San Francisco Zoo to the south, and 2+ miles of Ocean Beach to explore in between. Once the site of sand dunes, the Sunset as we know it today took shape after the 1906 Earthquake when residential development on the west side boomed. Much has come to the seaside since those sandy beginnings, including eclectic sundry stores, bicycle shops, local art galleries, scrumptious bites, and healthful grocers.

After a hike or photo session with Karl the Fog looking dramatic along the Pacific Coast, adventurers can find many hidden treasure just a short walk down Irving, Judah, Lawton, Noriega and Taraval Street. Surf shops, friendly neighbors, and cozy cafes give this corner of San Francisco a true beach town feel, with the flat, wide Avenues just calling for a quiet stroll or bike ride.

# **HISTORY HIGHLIGHTS**

Monarch, California's last captive grizzly, was the inspiration for the San Francisco Zoo. In 1889, the bear was brought to San Francisco and lived more than 20 years in captivity, mostly in Golden Gate Park; his profile adorns our state flag.

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Surfing legend Jack O'Neill invented wet suits and sold them in his newly opened surf shop on the Great Highway near Wawona Street in 1952.

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Two windmills standing near the Pacific Ocean in the western corners of Golden Gate Park were built at the beginning of the 20th Century to pump fresh water into the park's lakes and irrigation system. The Murphy Windmill features the longest sails in the world, with the ability to lift 40,000 gallons of water per hour.

In 1874, initial work in Golden Gate Park – largely by horticulturalist John McLaren - centered on planting trees to stabilize the dunes that covered three quarters of the area. By 1879, 155,000 trees were planted.

Sunday Streets is a program of the nonprofit Livable City presented in partnership with the SFMTA, San Francisco Department of Public Health, and the City and County of San Francisco.
